Pupils can find out what activities are running by checking the extra-curricular posters displayed in the PE department and around the school.




Young Leadership Pathway

S2-S6 pupils involved in our Young Leadership Pathway are currently working towards their

Saltire Award. This celebrates, recognises and rewards the commitment, contribution and achievements of young volunteers in Scotland aged 12-25, and volunteers are required to record the number of volunteering hours they accumulate. These pupils have supported several events and provisions throughout terms 1 & 2 to develop their skills, experience and volunteering hours, including the following:

- October holiday multi-sport camp for P1-P7 pupils.
- Kirkcaldy area cluster league basketball festival for Viewforth HS and Kirkcaldy HS cluster primary schools.
- Attendance at regional and national events, including the Fife Young Ambassador training day and national Sport Scotland Young Ambassador Day.
- Attendance at training courses, including Disability Inclusion training with Scottish Disability Sport.

Anthony Nolan

We recently hosted an Anthony Nolan Event. Anthony Nolan is the charity that makes lifesaving connections between patients in need and incredible strangers ready to donate their stem cells. For someone with blood cancer or a blood disorder, an amazing stranger donating their stem cells could be their best chance of survival. We worked in partnership with the Fire Service to have a blood drive event in school. This involved pupils and staff aged 16 to 30 giving a cheek swab sample to see if they are a match. Eligible donors will be added to the donor register and may be called on in the future to save a life.



Some of our S6 pupils volunteered to be Anthony Nolan Champions. Thank you to Rhonda Annan, Callie Chrichton, Megan Connelly, Chelsey Birrell and Leah Mackenzie for organising all of the appointments for eligble donors and ensuring the event ran smoothly.









ENTERPRISE IN THE ART DEPARTMENT

The Art department were keen to expand our enterprise efforts within our faculty and decided to showcase our talented pupil's work by selling it at the Christmas Show Case. They have taken the format of calendars, Christmas decorations and Christmas cards. Pupils were also involved in the selling of the items; it was a great opportunity for pupils to see their work for sale, and it was a sell out! Now to get our thinking caps on for next year.

CHRISTMAS CARD COMPETITION

Continuing our tradition of our annual Christmas card competition, this year's S1 and S2 participants made it very difficult for our judge to select our final 8 winners. Pupils created their outcomes using different techniques and media such as collage, printing, drawing and painting. The department were delighted with all their efforts.



S3 PHOTOGRAPHY: ANTI BULLYING PROJECT

Our S3 Photography students worked on a project in the run up to Anti-Bullying week to create an image that represents the emotions felt by someone who is being bullied. During Scottish Anti-Bullying week, we challenged students across the school to come up with slogans to turn their images into posters to display across the school. We even had input from our P7 transition visitors who posted their ideas for slogans too. The pupils did a wonderful job, and the posters are now displayed around the school.













ACES (Access to creative education in Scotland)

ACES is a funded initiative based across the four Art Schools in Scotland that works alongside schools to encourage, educate, and empower senior-phase pupils to consider careers and higher education in art, design, and architecture. We have a long-standing relationship with this programme and have a great track record of pupils from VHS continuing with the creative journey when they leave school.

Jenna Skinner (S6) has been in involved in a series of 3 Architecture workshops run by the ACES programme at DJCAD looking at different aspects of the design process and different types of architectural design. These photographs show the final workshop outcome of a shelter focussing on using light to create visual impact. She was able to meet students from across the east of Scotland and work with tutors from the university where she is applying next year.









ACES Life Drawing

Olivia Trebbi (S5) has attended an evening life drawing class at DJCAD. Every week Olivia is making the journey to Dundee where she has been drawing from observation of a live model. Olivia has been learning techniques for drawing faces/figures from all angles and working with media to render her outcomes. The images below show a fraction of the work Olivia has produced and we are always so excited to see her weekly outcomes. Olivia is planning to study at DJCAD, and this programme has been invaluable to allow her to have a taste of what it will be like when she goes to study full time.



DYW IN OUR DEPARTMENT: WORK EXPERIENCE

JENNA SKINNER - ARCHITECTURE PRACTICE

Jenna Skinner one of our Advanced Higher Design pupils took up the opportunity to complete a week's work experience with an Edinburgh based architecture firm- Simpson and Brown. The firm specialises in conservation architecture and is currently working on projects across the world. Our pupil was able to take part in site visits, speak with the onsite archaeologists, attend project planning meets as well as being given digital drawing and model making tasks. At the end of the week our pupil created a presentation that she delivered to the team of architects about the work she has been doing. The feedback from the firm was that "Her enthusiasm for architecture was clear and she has a great methodical approach. She made a beautiful model of one of our proposals which will be useful to us on the project. I'm not sure that I'd have made as good a job as her at that stage, or now! I enjoyed working with her and we also learn a lot through students' eyes."



ISLA GOULD (S6) – recently completed a weeklong inperson course at the Royal Conservatoire to help develop a greater understanding of the process for set and costume design, and how it relates to the performing arts. The course provided both practical and theoretical teaching which culminated in a final presentation of her designs in front of the other participants and tutors. This was an incredible opportunity to work alongside industry professionals to expand her awareness of the design process and ultimately build evidence for her portfolio. This experience confirmed to Isla that she will be applying to study at the Conservatoire, and they would be very lucky to have her on the course.

S3 First Chances visit to Fife College

Earlier in the term our S3 First Chances pupils were able to visit Fife College, Halbeath Campus. Here they took part in workshops to prepare them for research and presentation skills so they are better equipped to complete their 'Inspiring Scot's' presentations and essays in the new year. Pupils got to experience life as a student at the campus, visiting different subjects within the school, eating in the canteen and even having a go with some of their VR head sets and seeing 3D printers in action.



CyberFirst Girls competition

This was a team event open to girls from all over the country with teams working together to tackle online challenges from cryptography and logic to artificial intelligence and networking for the chance to be crowned cyber security champions. Career Ready



Our new 2023 cohort has been selected for Career Ready. The two-year programme empowers young people in S5/S6 to kick-start their chosen career through a series of authentic workplace experiences and a network of support. As part of the programme, they have several masterclasses to attend, a mentor from the world of work as well as a 4-week work placement.



We attended the 2023 launch event at the Carnegie Conference Centre in Dunfermline where students met their mentors for the first time. It was fantastic to attend the event with all 18 high schools in Fife present. Well done to Kerry Sarjanston, Abigail Lonergan, Charlie Douglas, Ruby Emmerson, Jayden Fox and Branden Morgan. The minister for Education, Jenny Gilruth came to start the event. We were fortunate enough to be selected for her to speak to. Criminology









In November the S3 Criminology class took part in a forensic investigation activity at Fife College. They were presented with an outdoor crime scene to process - under the guidance of a former Police Scotland lead-detective. The pupils involved showed great enthusiasm as they donned their PPE, secured the scene, and identified and packed up the evidence in a professional way. They then got down to work in the college's forensic lab: carrying out blood testing and finger-printing to help solve the case. There were clearly some budding criminal investigators amongst the group, and the pupils made full use of this excellent opportunity to learn about the forensic side of criminology.







Drama

S1 Drama

Our S1s have just completed their Gruesome Great Britain unit, in which they explored characters such as Sweeney Todd, Mrs Lovett, Sawney Bean, Burke and Hare. They explored exciting ways to perform their dramas including, tableaux, aside, narration, slow motion and split-stage.

They also created excellent costume and make-up designs for these gruesome characters.

S2 DRAMA

I am delighted to report that the Drama Department have successfully, for the second year running, run our new Commedia dell'afte unit. Pupils have enjoyed learning about this timeworn form of theatrical comedy dating back to 16th century Italy; dawning traditional commedia masks and devising comical scenarios to perform for their peers.

S3 Drama

Our S3s have just completed their drama skills unit, in which they devised their own performances, wrote scripts, and sourced costume and props.

N5 DRAMA

Our N5 Drama class have this term completed their production unit in which they staged a short extract from the National Theatre adaptation of Let the Right One In: which was first performed at the Dundee Rep Theatre in 2013.

Our candidates had the monumental task of not only performing this extract but also designing lighting, sound, costume and make-up for the performance. Some of the highlights were the fantastically gory make-up effects created by our team of designers and a fabulous costume photoshoot showcasing our actors posing as their respective characters.


Holly and Amelia were selected this year to participate in the 'Lessons from Auschwitz' project funded by the Scottish Government. This programme is designed to ensure that the memory of the Holocaust lives on through the voices of survivors and the educational experiences of future generations.

Prior to the visit, Holly and Amelia attended an event on the 31st of October, where they had the privilege of listening to Holocaust survivor, 91-year-old Janine Webber, as she shared her story. Holly had the opportunity to ask Janine a question; she asked what memory from her experiences had resonated with her the most. Janine declared that the loss of her family remains her most prominent memory of the Holocaust.

Holly and Amelia will be sharing their knowledge and experience with the pupils at Viewforth High School in the new year.




Enterprising Maths Fife Schools Competition for S3/S4 pupils (4 October 2023)

Mentors in Violence Prevention

MVP stands for Mentors in Violence Prevention. MVP is a peer education programme helping young people to explore and challenge the attitudes, beliefs and cultural norms that underpin gender-based violence, bullying and other forms of abuse.

Twenty S5/6 pupils undertook an MVP training day. This included learning about how to lead a lesson, what MVP is, what different forms of abuse look like and the importance of standing up to violence and making a difference.

As a part of the program senior MVP pupils (S5/S6) led interactive lessons to S1/S2 pupils about the effects of abuse, teaching the younger pupils how to manage the situation and report it. This aims to prevent violence and spread awareness of the effects that abuse and bullying have on a person and make them aware that not all violence is physical.

During anti-bullying week (Monday 13th- Friday 17th of November) the MVP mentors led assemblies to the junior pupils, educating them on anti-bullying week and the importance of being an effective bystander.

Pupils have the opportunity every Wednesday in the cafeteria which is named "Wednesday Pop Up" to raise their concerns and worries to an MVP mentor. The aim of this is for pupils to have the chance to speak to senior pupils and ask their advice on how to manage different real-life scenarios.



Music

Song Writing Workshop

On Wednesday 4 October, ten senior music pupils attended a songwriting workshop in Dunfermline High School. This was hosted by the Scottish Music Centre and we listened to Edinburgh-based singer/songwriter 'Withered Hand' (Dan Willson) tell us about his journey from school to being a recording artist.

Despite a fire alarm while we were there, followed by 10 minutes in the pouring rain, a great time was had by all! It was fascinating to have a real life artist explain his process of writing music and where he gets inspiration from. This immediately inspired some of the students to begin writing lyrics for a new song on the bus on the way back to school!

Battle of the Bands Competition

The Battle of the Bands 2023 competition held at Woodmill High School on the 8th November, where two of our senior pupils and their band "Permacrisis" had a very successful evening. The band won best overall band and the Matthew Barrie Shield and as part of this prize they have also won a recording studio session at Fife College. The band members are - Alex Harrower (lead guitar), Rowan Docherty (vocals), Jason Simms (bass guitar - former Kirkcaldy High School pupil) and Ashton Lee Mcindoe (drums - Kirkcaldy HS pupil). 


Extra-Curricular Group & Study Support

Hybrid Meetings




U18s Fife Schools representative football team

Christmas Writing Competition for P7


