Completion of 'Introduction to Cluster Leagues and Holiday Camp training






Punch Beyond Programme

DUNDEE ART TRIP: DJCAD DREGREE SHOW AND KIMONO EXHIBITION V&A

Senior phase pupils in S5 & 6 had the opportunity to browse all the work of the final year students covering a range of artistic disciplines across multiple media and genres, from architecture to animation. We have had the pleasure of teaching this group of pupils from S1 and most of this group are planning to apply to a creative course. By exposing our pupils to a range of styles and practices it gives them inspiration to think about how they might want to respond to the world around them when they go to Art College. As staff we can't wait to attend all their Degree Shows. Congratulations to Oonagh Maxwell whose artwork formed part of the degree. As a previous Viewforth pupil we are very proud of her success, and it was so special to see her work on display.

Our next stop was to visit V&A Dundee's latest visiting exhibition, Kimono: Kyoto to catwalk we all agreed it was a fascinating story about the significance, appeal and influence of this iconic garment. We feasted our eyes on an extraordinary collection of over 300 garments, accessories, prints and paintings and photographs. Both staff and pupils were so inspired that we hoping to look at designers such as Issey Miyake for the critical component of the course.





HIGHER PHOTOGRAPHY

This course inspires and creatively challenges our pupils by encouraging them to visually represent their personal thoughts and ideas through the medium of photography. This is a course we have been running for 9 years in the department. In fact, Mrs Gibb's degree is in Photography and is the go-to person for anything photography related. In 2020 we introduced an additional course called NPA Photography (Level 5) that can be picked up from S3 onwards. Both photography courses don't require you to also take Art + Design these courses are independent of each other. We are really enjoying delivering this course and are feeding into competitions and are looking forward to continuing developing this side of the department.






ART & DESIGN

BATTLEFIELDS TRIP









At the start of June, 40 Viewforth High School pupils participated in a 6-day trip to the WWI battlefields of France and Belgium.

Our adventure began with an overnight drive to Dover, followed by a ferry crossing to Dunkirk. On our first day, we explored the charming city of Bruges.

The next day took us to the Ypres Salient, where we visited significant sites like Messines, Sanctuary Wood, and Hill 60. Each location offered insights into the strategic military operations of the time.

Day four brought us to the Somme Battlefields, a poignant reminder of the war's devastating impact. Stops included Newfoundland Park, Thiepval, and Vimy Ridge, where we deepened our understanding of the conflict's scale and the soldiers' sacrifices. A particularly touching part of the day was when a few of our pupils visited the sites of their own fallen family members.

On the fifth day, we explored more of the Ypres Salient, including Essex Farm, Passchendaele, and Tyne Cot Cemetery. Our day concluded in Ypres, where we participated in the moving Menin Gate Ceremony, honouring the fallen with the Last Post.

Throughout the trip, our pupils were fantastic. They showed deep respect and interest in the historical significance of each site, making us incredibly proud. Their excellent behaviour and enthusiasm were truly commendable. This journey not only enriched their understanding of history but also highlighted what an outstanding group of students we have at Viewforth High School.





DRAMA



S1 Drama

Our S1s have just completed a Darkwood Manor unit in which they created characters for a mission to spend the night in a haunted manor. They created excellent scenes exploring the backstory of the Manor, as well as developing characterisation techniques such as writing in role, role on the wall, character card and hot seating to help develop their understanding of their characters.

They have settled into S2 well, and are currently exploring a skills for work unit in which they have applied/interviewed for a job at NASA and must work together on a mission to save Earth from an asteroid!

<u>S2 Drama</u>

Our S2s just completed a Murder Mystery unit inspired by Cluedo in which they created dramas exploring the backstory of each suspect in order to gather clues to find out who killed Mr Boddy!

They explored alternative ways to perform their dramas, using conventions such as: tableaux, aside, narration, slow motion and split-stage.

They also created excellent costume, make-up and props designs for each suspect to further build evidence. They have settled into S3 very well, and are currently exploring teamwork, collaboration and creativity through an improvisation unit.

S2 DRAMA

Our S2 pupils have been exploring through drama the history of Annie Moore who was the first Irish immigrant to the United States to pass through federal immigrant inspection at the Ellis Island station in New York Harbour.

Classes have been roleplaying and performing key moments from Annie's Journey and as one of their tasks they were given an old photo (stimulus) from the time period and challenged to use body language, facial expressions and use of space to produce a set of tableaus which could seamlessly blend into the period photos. Some of our pupils also delivered fantastic monologues to accompany these tableaus. We concluded our journey through history by exploring the notorious characters and villainous personalities found in New York's Five Points district. A cheap, crime ridden slum that provided the worst living conditions in the United States and was the home of the original gangs of New York.

Our pupils used drama skills to bring these notorious New York gangsters to life: combining costume, make-up and a little photo wizardry to produce police mug shots for each of their criminal characters. (see attached photo)

<u>S3 Drama</u>

Our S3s have settled into National level very well and are currently working through their first few outcomes in which they have developed ideas for a devised drama.

They have shown enthusiasm/commitment toward the current workshop unit in which they are practically exploring drama in relation to the written paper and consolidating their learning through past paper questions.







Duke of Edinburgh Bronze Expedition

At the end of May, 12 pupils took part in a Bronze Expedition from Viewforth High School and along the Fife Coastal Path to Shell Bay. The first day saw the pupils walk from the school to Silverburn, near Leven, where they camped that night. The pupils were lucky as after a lovely sunny day they were able to set up their tents before a heavy rain shower at dinner time. After the rain had passed the pupils were able to explore the gardens at Silverburn and enjoyed a campfire roasting marshmallows and starbursts as well as making s'mores. After cooking their breakfast and packing up the campsite the pupils set off in their groups the next morning as they walked from the Silverburn to Shell Bay.

During the expedition, all of the pupils did amazingly and represented both the school and themselves to a high level and followed the Duke of Edinburgh Expedition Requirements needed to be awarded their Expedition Section. Over the two days the pupils tried new experiences for the first time and interacted with others that are not in their social groups. The staff on the expedition witnessed a growth in confidence and skill sets in each of the pupils and were really proud of how they handled themselves and worked together to motivate their team and others on. The pupils were a credit to the school as they also received positive comments from members of the public.



Duke of Edinburgh Silver Training Day

On Thursday 30th May our Silver DofE pupils headed to Lochore Meadows for a training day to help prepare them for their Practice Expedition in June. The pupils took part in a variety of activities including building tents, campsite skills and brushed up on their map reading skills as they completed some orienteering around Lochore Meadows. After lunch the pupils then embarked on a walk up Benarty Hill and on reaching the summit they were met with stunning views across Loch Leven as well as Fife before following the same route back to Lochore Meadows. A great day was had by all.





DUKE OF EDINBURGH

Duke of Edinburgh Silver Practice Expedition

On Monday 17th June our Duke of Edinburgh Silver group embarked on their practice expedition in the Lomond Hills Regional Park. The first day saw the pupils dropped off at Glenvale, near Gateside. The pupils then walked up past John Knox's Pulpit and over to Harperleas Reservoir before cutting down to Craigmead Car Park. After a short break the pupils then walked down towards Falkland via Mapsie Den as they headed for Pillars of Hercules where they would be camping for two nights. The pupils were lucky as after a lovely sunny day they were able to set up their tents before a heavy rain shower at dinner time. After the rain had passed the pupils cooked their dinner and enjoyed a campfire roasting marshmallows and starbursts as well as making s'mores before playing some games.

The following morning the pupils cooked their breakfast before they set off for a day exploring the Lomond Hills. In the morning they headed back up to Craigmead Car Park before walking up East Lomond. On returning to Craigmead the pupils stopped for lunch before heading up West Lomond, the highest point in Fife. Despite a heavy rain shower not long after starting their walk up West Lomond the pupils showed great resilience as they battled on and enjoyed lovely sunny conditions as they approached the summit. On reaching the summit the pupils were able to enjoy views of Fife, Loch Leven and over towards Dundee. The pupils then returned to the campsite at Pillars of Hercules and they arrived back just in time before the rain started for the evening.

The third and final day of the expedition saw the pupils cook their breakfast before they packed up the campsite and started their walk from Pillars of Hercules to Scotlandwell. Tuesday night's rain had cleared and the pupils got lovely sunny conditions for their final day of walking. The group retraced their steps back to Harperleas Reservoir and started walking back towards John Knox's Pulpit before taking the path which took them up to Bishop Hill and across to White Craigs. From here the pupils started their descent down the hill through Kilmagad Orchard to their final destination at Scotlandwell.

During the expedition, all of the pupils did amazingly and represented both the school and themselves to a high level and followed the Duke of Edinburgh Expedition Requirements needed for the Expedition Section. Over the three days the pupils showed great teamwork as they bonded well as a team. The expedition was tough at times as it pushed the pupils out of their comfort zone but the pupils showed fantastic determination as they supported each other to complete the expedition. The pupils can be proud of their achievements and the staff on the expedition witnessed great skills such as their cooking skills, which also got compliments from the other DofE groups at the campsite, and were really proud of how the pupils handled themselves.

- A script/graphic novel or play conversion



Higher Geography Trip to Glasgow

On Wednesday 31st January 2024, the Higher Geography pupils visited Glasgow to collect the data for their Higher Geography Assignments. The pupils visited Stepps, Glasgow Fort and Buchanan Street before getting a train from Glasgow Central to Queens Park to collect data for Govanhill. At each location the pupils completed a variety of geographical techniques including pedestrian counts, environmental quality surveys, traffic counts and questionnaires. Despite the heavy rain the pupils were able to gather the data required before returning to the classroom to process the data ahead of writing up their assignment later in the term. As well as gathering the data the pupils also got some time to explore the variety of shops at Glasgow Fort as well as stopping off at Starbucks on the way home for a well-deserved hot drink.









S2 Dynamic Earth Trip

On Wednesday 8th May 38 S2 pupils went on a Geography trip to Dynamic Earth in Edinburgh. After the bus arrived in the capital the first activity the pupils did was a Climate Change Fundamentals workshop. Through group discussion and interactive activities, the workshop introduced pupils to climate change, as they explored how climate change is affecting the UK, understand the science behind it and work together to identify solutions at local, national and international levels. After the workshop the pupils explored the exhibition galleries as they; travelled back to the beginning of time to learn about the big bang theory, experienced what it is like to

travel in a spaceship, felt the ground shudder as molten lava flowed straight towards them and touched an iceberg which everyone had great fun doing. The pupils also got to experience a 3D film as they flew around

the different climatic zones in the world and visited the Amazon rainforest gallery to learn about the animals found there. After completing the tour it was then time for lunch. After lunch the pupils headed for the Planetarium to watch a 30 minute film called We are Stars which explored the secrets of cosmic chemistry and our explosive origins. A great day in the capital finished with a visit to the souvenir shop before everyone got back on the bus to head home.




GEOGRAPHY




There is also a Code Club for S1/2 Pupils on Tuesday lunchtime:

Maths Challenge

Pupils had to work in groups to solve problems, complete a tangram and solve questions as part of a relay. Well done to all who took part! Another group of P7 pupils joined us as part of the extra-curricular morning to complete a range of maths games, puzzles and chess.

Flight Academy

On the 27th of June 15 S3 pupils will visit the Flight Academy at Glasgow Science Centre. They will take part in a full day workshop using maths and physics to plan and prepare for a rescue mission flight. They will need to carry out mathematical calculations using distance, speed and time, as well as practicing navigation skills. They will work in "crews" and will carry out their mission by completing a flight in full motion flight simulators. It should be a fantastic trip!

We were delighted to have P7s from our cluster primaries in science during their transition. Pupils learned about lab safety and successfully carried out experiments using Bunsen burners.


